

# CONSUMER PRICE INDEX



**April 2011**

**C**onsumer Price Index (CPI), in April 2011, resulted 112.2 percent against December 2007 (December 07=100), signing a decrease of 0.6 percent against the previous month.

**T**he annual rate in April 2011 is 4.1 percent. A year before the annual rate was 3.7 percent.

**T**he index of "Food and non-alcoholic beverage" signed a decrease by 1.5 percent. Within this group the highest decrease by 12.6 percent it was notice in the "vegetables included potatoes" subgroup. Here can be mentioned decrease prices of cucumber by 49.5 percent, spinach by 22.9 percent, tomatoes by 19.0 percent, eggplant by 18.6 percent, pepper by 11.8 percent etc. Price in the "fruits" subgroup signed an increase by 4.0 percent, where can be mentioned increase price of lemons by 8.8 percent, oranges by 7.6 percent, apple by 6.5 percent, kiwi by 1.2 percent etc. During the April prices are increase in some other subgroups of this group, where can be mentioned increases in the subgroups "bread and cereals" 1.0 percent, "fish" by 1.0 percent, "milk, cheese and eggs" by 0.3 percent etc.

**T**he index of "Alcoholic drink and tobacco" group signed an increase of 0.1 percent; within it prices of tobacco is increase by 0.1 percent.

**T**he index of "Clothing and footwear" group signed a decrease by 0.3 percent, within it prices of clothing signed a decrease by 0.1 percent, and prices of footwear signed an decrease by 0.4 percent.

**T**he index of "Rent, water, fuel and power" group signed a decrease by 0.1 percent; within it the price of fuel is decrease by 0.3 percent.

**T**he index of "Health" group signed an increase by 0.1 percent, where can be mention increase prices of medicaments by 0.1 percent.

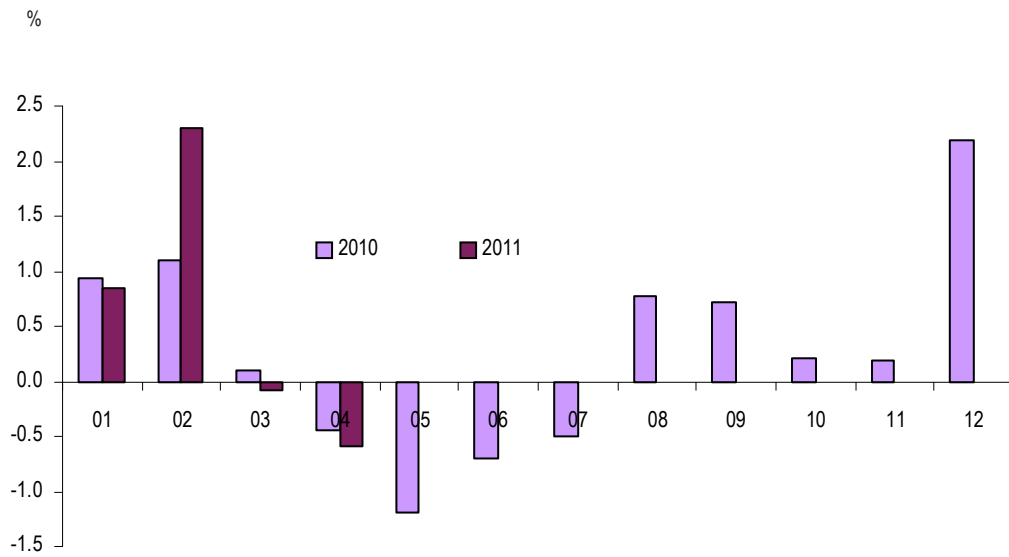
**T**he index of "Transport" group signed an increase by 0.7 percent. In April price of diesel signed an increase by 2.4 percent and price of petrol signed an increase by 0.2 percent.

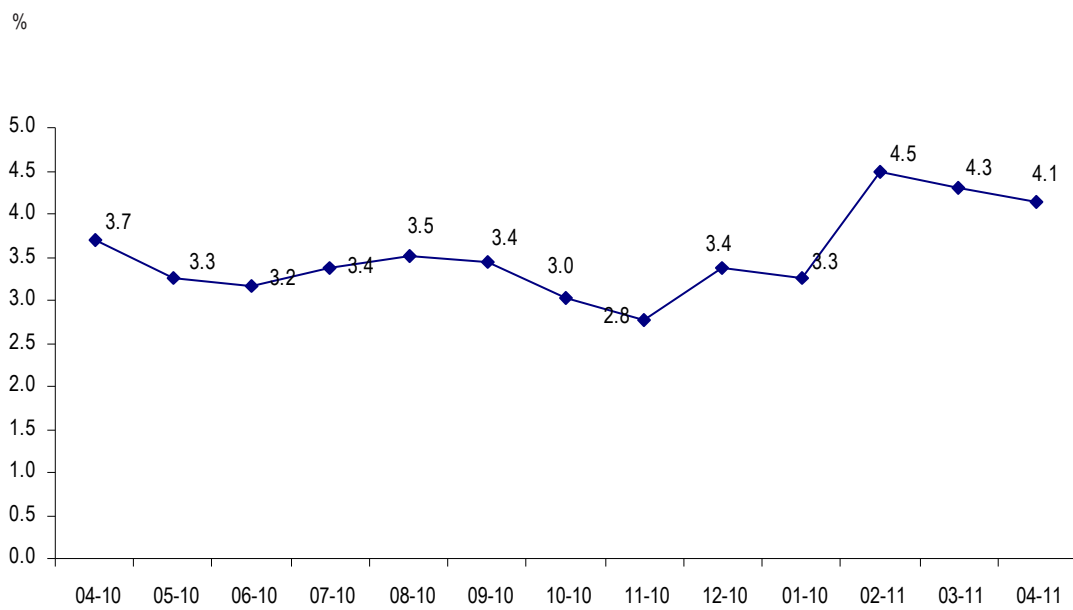

**METHODOLOGICAL EXPLANATION**

Consumer Price Index (CPI) is calculated with a new basket of product from January 2008. Weights are based on the results of the Household Budget Survey, carried out during October 2006 – September 2007.

December 2007 is considered as the base period (December 2007 = 100)

Previous change of the product basket was from January 2002, where the number of the products was increased from 221 to 262 products.

In the new basket the number of product is 272.

The international classification, COICOP, with 12 main groups was introduced to the previous product basket and it will continue to be used with the new product basket.

The index will cover all Albanian (rural and urban) territory. The previous index covered only the urban area.

The product weights will be different for each region.

Prices are collected in main cities of 11 prefectures were Kukes is within the prefecture of Diber.

The Consumer Price Index of Albania is a Laspeyres type index:

$$I_{0,i}^t = \frac{\sum_i P_i^t * Q_i^0}{\sum_i P_i^0 * Q_i^0}$$

With weights ( $w = P * Q$ ) from base period this is approximated to:

$$I_{0,i}^t = \sum_i w_i * \left( \frac{P_i^t}{P_i^0} \right)$$

In more detail, a price relative is calculated for each item and region with geometrical mean on the sample of outlets:

$$PR_{t-1,ij}^t = \prod_{k=1}^n \left( \frac{P_{ijk}^t}{P_{ijk}^{t-1}} \right)^{1/n}$$

Monthly chaining gives the price relative from the base period:

$$PR_{0,ij}^t = PR_{0,ij}^1 * \Lambda * PR_{t-1,ij}^t$$

The price relatives are aggregated geographically to form product indices on items for whole Albania:

$$I_{0,i}^t = \sum_j r_{ij} * PR_{0,ij}^t \quad \text{where} \quad \sum_j r_{ij} = 1 \quad : \quad \forall_i \quad (\text{for all cases})$$

Aggregation over items then gives the CPI of Albania:

$$CPI_0^t = \sum_i w_i \cdot I_{0,i}^t \quad \text{where} \quad \sum_i w_i = 1$$

The annual rate measures the price change between the current month and the same month of the previous year. This measure is responsive to recent changes in price levels but can be influenced by one-off effect in either month

The monthly rate measures the price change between current month and previous month. Although up-to-date it can be affected by seasonal and other effects.

The 12-month average rate compares average Consumer Price Indices ant the latest 12 month to the average of the previous 12 months.
